

Thank you for taking the time to meet with us on Friday. We are looking forward to a good conversation! The BLM Washington Office. in response to Secretarial Order 3353, has requested information from each BLM office regarding issues their State may have had with the GRSG plan and associated policies. The WO is hoping to gather the information in order to synthesize it range-wide and prepare a report to the Secretary. I have begun to compile the information using a template provided by the BLM WO - a draft is attached. I started with the Governor's consistency review letter and various informal communications. The RMPA does not allow waivers or modifications to **NSO-46e**. For exceptions to be granted the proposed action:

- (i) Would not have direct, indirect, or cumulative effects on GRSG or its habitat; or
- (ii) Is proposed to be undertaken as an alternative to a similar action occurring on a nearby parcel, and would provide a clear conservation gain to GRSG.

Exceptions based on conservation gain (ii) may only be considered in: (a) PHMA of mixed ownership where federal minerals underlie less than 50 percent of the total surface; or (b) areas of BLM-administered lands where the proposed exception is an alternative to an action occurring on a nearby parcel subject to a valid federal fluid mineral lease existing as of the date of this RMP (revision or amendment). Exceptions based on conservation gain must also include measures, such as enforceable institutional controls and buffers, sufficient to allow the BLM to conclude that such benefits will endure for the duration of the proposed action's impacts.

The BLM Authorized Officer may not grant an exception unless the applicable state wildlife agency, USFWS, and BLM unanimously find that the proposed action satisfies (i) or (ii). A team of one field biologist or other GRSG expert shall initially make such finding from each respective agency. In the event the initial finding is not unanimous, the finding may be elevated to the appropriate BLM State Director, USFWS State Ecological Services Director, and state wildlife agency head for final resolution. In the event their finding is not unanimous, the exception will not be granted.

#### Issue:

The Proposed LUPA delegates to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) the ability to veto proposed exceptions to NSO stipulations generally required on oil and gas leases in PHMA, even if Colorado's Division of Parks and Wildlife (CPW) and BLM biologists find that the proposed exception is unlikely to harm Greater Sage Grouse. (See Appendix D and Table 2.2 at p. 2-21). With the exception of species listed under the Endangered Species Act (ESA), Colorado's Parks and Wildlife Commission and CPW have statutory authority over wildlife management in Colorado.

As the greater sage-grouse has not been listed as endangered or threatened under the ESA (and the goal of the LUPA is to keep it that way) FWS does not have jurisdiction over management decisions concerning the greater sage-grouse or its habitat in Colorado.

Colorado BLM worked with cooperating agencies, including DNR and CPW to provide flexibility while protecting sage-grouse by:

- 1. prohibiting leasing within one mile of lek
- 2. Apply NSO stip beyond one mile and to remainder of PHMA.
- 3. Determine, on a case-by-case basis, the impacts to sage-grouse vs the benefits of off-site mitigation. The requirement for consensus in order for NSO exceptions to be granted removed overall strategy of working with industry/state partners, etc, to determine impacts to grouse specific to Colorado's unique habitat in the southeastern portion of range.

## THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR WASHINGTON

ORDER NO. 3353

Subject: Greater Sage-Grouse Conservation and Cooperation with Western States

Sec. 1 Purpose. The purposes of the Order are to: (1) enhance cooperation between the Department of the Interior (Department) and the States of Oregon, Washington, California, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming, and Colorado (the Eleven Western States) in the management and conservation of the Greater Sage-Grouse (Sage-Grouse) and its habitat; (2) support a partnership with clearly defined objectives and roles for Federal and State entities responsible for Sage-Grouse management and conservation in order to sustain healthy populations of the species; and (3) establish a team to review the Federal land management agencies' Sage-Grouse plan amendments and revisions completed on or before September 2015.

Sec. 2 Authorities. This Order is issued under the authority of section 2 of Reorganization Plan No. 3 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1262), as amended, and pursuant to the land management and programmatic authorities of the bureaus identified below in section 4b.

Sec. 3 Background. The Department has broad responsibilities to manage Federal lands and resources for the public's benefit, including, but not limited to, permitting authorized uses; managing habitat to support fish, wildlife, and other resources; protecting cultural resources; and providing recreational and educational opportunities on Federal lands and waters.

The State agencies responsible for fish and wildlife management possess broad powers for the protection and management of fish, wildlife, and plants within their borders, except where preempted by Federal law. State agencies are at the forefront of efforts to maintain healthy fish and wildlife populations and to conserve at-risk species to ensure that protection under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) is not required.

The State-Federal Sage-Grouse Task Force (SGTF) was established in 2011 as a forum for high-level State and Federal representatives to meet and evaluate policies, programs, management actions, data sharing, and other actions affecting conservation of the Sage-Grouse and the sagebrush ecosystem, as well as the health of the communities and economies of the American West.

In September 2015, the Department and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) adopted amendments and revisions to 98 Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and U.S. Forest Service (USFS) land use plans across the Eleven Western States addressing, in part, the Sage-Grouse and its habitat (the 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans). The 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans govern management of 67 million acres of Federal lands. More than half of remaining Sage-Grouse habitat is on land managed by BLM and USFS. As the Department moves forward in the management of Sage-Grouse habitat, it is imperative that it does so in a manner that allows both

wildlife and local economies to thrive and incorporate the expertise of Federal employees in the field, local conditions, and proven State and local approaches.

In October 2015, in reliance upon the conservation commitments and progress reflected in Federal land use plan amendments and revisions and other private, State, and Federal conservation efforts, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) determined that the Sage-Grouse did not warrant listing under the ESA. In making that finding, FWS committed to work with State and Federal partners to conduct a Sage-Grouse status review in 5 years.

#### Sec. 4 Policy.

## a. <u>Cooperation with the Eleven Western States on Sage-Grouse Conservation</u> Efforts.

Consistent with governing laws, regulations, and policies, the Department will implement a multifaceted strategy to enhance cooperation with the Eleven Western States primarily responsible for the management and conservation of Sage-Grouse. The strategy will include supporting a partnership that allows the Department and the Eleven Western States to maintain healthy populations of Sage-Grouse and improve collaboration and integration of State and local concerns and approaches into sagebrush management and conservation on Federal lands. Accordingly, and subject to paragraph 4b, below, the BLM Director, working with other heads of bureaus and offices within the Department, USFS, and affected States through the SGTF, shall develop:

- (i) memorandums of understanding and other agreements with states and other partners regarding implementation of the 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans;
- (ii) training for BLM staff regarding implementation of the 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans, including direction to consider state and local information, as appropriate; and
- (iii) memorandums of understanding and other agreements with States and other partners regarding integration of information on Sage-Grouse populations into Federal land management decisions.

#### b. Department of the Interior Sage-Grouse Review Team.

This Order establishes the Sage-Grouse Review Team (Team). The Team will be made up of land managers and other professionals from bureaus and offices, including BLM, FWS, and the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS). The Team will closely coordinate with USDA and USFS. The Team will engage with appropriate State agencies through the SGTF to coordinate its work. The Team is hereby directed to conduct:

 a review of the plans and programs that States already have in place to ensure that the 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans adequately complement state efforts to conserve the species;

- (ii) a further examination, through the framework established by the Integrated Rangeland Fire Management Strategy, of issues associated with preventing and fighting the proliferation of invasive grasses and wildland fire, which are leading threats to Sage-Grouse habitat;
- (iii) an examination of the impact on individual States disproportionately affected by the large percentage of Federal lands within their borders, recognizing that those lands are important to resource use and development, and to the conservation of the Sage-Grouse;
- (iv) a review of the 2015 Sage-Grouse Plans and associated polices, including seven BLM Instruction Memoranda (IM) issued in September 2016. The review will include (1) identification of provisions that may require modification or rescission, as appropriate, in order to give appropriate weight to the value of energy and other development of public lands within BLM's overall multiple-use mission and to be consistent with the policy set forth in Secretary's Order 3349, "American Energy Independence," implementing the Executive Order signed by the President on March 28, 2017, "Promoting Energy Independence and Economic Growth"; and (2) opportunities to conserve the Sage-Grouse and its habitat without inhibiting job creation and local economic growth;
- (v) as appropriate, the Team should provide recommendations with regard to (1) captive breeding; (2) opportunities to enhance State involvement; (3) efficacy of target populations on a State-by-State basis; and (4) additional steps that can be taken in the near term to maintain or improve the current population levels and habitat conditions.

#### Sec. 5. Implementation.

- a. Within 10 days of the signing of this Order, the Deputy Secretary will designate individuals from within the Department to serve on the Team.
- b. The BLM Director will designate an individual to coordinate all activities by and within the Department with respect to implementation of this Order.
- c. All bureaus and offices are directed to immediately begin implementing section 4 of this Order by identifying opportunities for cooperative management agreements and collaborative partnerships with the Eleven Western States and by outlining any specific steps to be undertaken.
- d. Within 60 days of the date of this Order, the Team shall provide a report to the Secretary summarizing the review set forth in section 4b of this Order and provide recommendations regarding additional steps the Department should take to address any issues identified as a result of that review.
- Sec. 6 Effect of Order. This Order is intended to improve the internal management of the Department. This Order and any resulting reports or recommendations are not intended to and

do not create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, instrumentalities or entities, its officers or employees, or any other person. To the extent there is any inconsistency between the provisions of this Order and any Federal laws or regulations, the laws or regulations will control.

Sec. 7 Expiration Date. This Order is effective immediately and will remain in effect until its provisions are accomplished, amended, superseded, or revoked, whichever occurs first.

The Integrated Rangeland Fire Management Strategy (IRFMS) provides a comprehensive approach in addressing wildland fire and invasive species in the sagebrush rangelands, with a particular focus on integrated fire and resource vegetation and restoration projects. The strategy emphasizes the use of collaboration and integration with partners to prioritize resources, budgets, and capacity; and promote efficiency and expediency in managing the sagebrush rangelands. The IRFMS lists numerous Action Items including both long- and short-term activities in fire and fuels management, post-fire restoration, and large-scale removal of invasive annual grasses. The IRFMS also supports the development of a sagebrush centered conservation and restoration strategy, which is being addressed through collaboration with WAFWA in the development of their Sagebrush Conservation Strategy.

Thanks for your participation yesterday. Some good discussion, excellent insight, and I think we're all marching off in the same direction. Here's what I have as the decisions that came out of the call:

### **Purpose of Communication Efforts**

We'll keep things simple, clear, focused. The materials will be designed to provide a high-level overview. Given the short deadlines and anticipated nature of the scoping meetings, a formal communication plan will not be developed.

### Format of the Scoping Meeting

It will be left to the individual states to decide on the format (open house, formal presentation, or hybrid) that best suits its needs and purposes. However, it is encouraged that the meetings begin with an explanation of background and purpose. The primary

objectives of the scoping meetings are to explain the process and invite the public to comment. A PowerPoint, developed by the communication team leadership, will be available to help with that portion of the meeting. "Comment stations" are an option for meeting attendees who want to submit their thoughts at the scoping meetings.

### Products/Materials

Communication team leadership will develop the PowerPoint, key messages, talking points, Q&As, and some of the boilerplate material -- how to comment, what makes a useful comment, where to send comments.

States will be responsible for maps, signs, sign-in sheets, key contact lists, public outreach and briefings to key constituents.

States also have the latitude to develop other materials to address specific needs.

#### **Review of Materials**

Communications team leadership will have a package within a week and send it out for a quick, "fatal flaw only" review. After comments are reconciled, the package will be given to Cally Younger, through SDs Tim Murphy and Mary Jo Rugwell, for WO/DOI approval. #### Dear Secretary Zinke:

The Energy Council is a non-profit trade organization that promotes safe and environmentally responsible natural gas development and CO<sub>2</sub> production in La Plata, Archuleta, Montezuma and Dolores Counties in Colorado on fee, tribal and federal lands. Our thirty-four individual and company members work to build community relations, increase public understanding, and address public issues relative to the industry.

We, <u>do not</u> support the La Plata County Commissioner's letter dated October 12, 2017 that was emailed to you which supports the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) Master Leasing Plan (MLP) for the country. In fact, we request that the Master Leasing Plan for the Tres Rios Filed office be rescinded.

Instructional Memorandum 2010-117 has specific criteria for MLP requirements and zero of the four criteria are present in the lands now under a Master Leasing Plan.

According to the Instruction Memorandum, the preparation of an MLP is required when all four of the following criteria are met:

- A substantial portion of the area to be analyzed in the MLP is not currently leased.
- There is a majority Federal mineral interest.
- The oil and gas industry has expressed a specific interest in leasing, and there is a moderate or high potential for oil and gas confirmed by the discovery of oil and gas in the general area.
- Additional analysis or information is needed to address likely resource or cumulative impacts if oil and gas development were to occur where there are:
  - o multiple-use or natural/cultural resource conflicts;
  - o impacts to air quality;
  - o impacts on the resources or values of any unit of the National Park System, national wildlife refuge, or National Forest wilderness area, as
  - o determined after consultation or coordination with the NPS, the FWS, or the FS; or
  - o impacts on other specially designated areas.

A MLP may also be completed **under other circumstances at the discretion** of the Field Manager, District Manager, *or State Director*.

State Director Ruth Welch unilaterally used the discretion clause and put into place a MLP and the BLM made their announcement on December 18, 2016. This is the first time in the Nation that we know of where a State Director has placed lands into a Master Leasing Plan. The plan is to be developed and implemented in the region between Dolores and Durango, Colorado and funded sometime in June of 2018. The MLP will cost money and time for the BLM and industry and a delay to any federal lease sales until the MLP is completed, perhaps years from now.

I participated in a sub-group of the BLM Southwest Resource Advisory Council (SW RAC) researching elements of a Master Leasing Plan and our subgroup presented our comments to the full SW RAC in April of 2015. The SW RAC did not recommend a Master Leasing Plan. Historically, in a letter from Bureau of Land Management, Lori Armstrong, received August 16,2013 and addressed to the La Plata County Commissioners: "Given the small amount of BLM managed surface and federal mineral interest, the lack of confirmed discovery of oil or gas, and the extremely limited number of federal leases or potential for development in this area, we found this area of western La Plata County is not a viable candidate at this time for a Master Leasing Plan."

During public meetings and public comments there was a highly organized and coordinated effort, with training for the public, to comment that they wanted a MLP. It was very evident during this public testimony that many of the hundreds of commenters had never read the Resource Management Plan that was released in February of 2015.

The Energy Council does not support the BLM moving forward with a Master Leasing Plan based on the following current legislation, policy, and protections:

- BLM RMP released February 2015
- Federal Lands Policy Act 1976

We respectfully ask that you rescind, or un-fund or cancel the arbitrary Master Leasing Plan for the Tres Rios Field office. Industry has always respected multiple use, but environmental activists and some elected officials have found a delay process for leasing federal minerals by calling for and getting Master Leasing Plans. We appreciate the opportunity to provide this input for your consideration and look forward to continuing leasing and production operations on BLM managed lands.



# **Department of the Interior Releases Energy Burdens Report**

Outlines Trump Administration's bold approach to achieving American energy dominance

**WASHINGTON** – Today, the U.S. Department of the Interior released the "Review of the Department of the Interior Actions that Potentially Burden Domestic Energy" report which was produced in response to Executive Order 13783. The report identified agency actions that potentially burden the development or use of domestically produced energy resources, with particular attention to oil, natural gas, coal, and nuclear energy resources. Interior oversees America's oil, gas, coal, hydropower, and renewable energy resources produced on federal lands and waters, which account for almost one-fifth of the Nation's energy and generate on average \$10 billion per year in annual revenue. Today, Secretary Zinke also signed Secretarial Order 3358, that will establish the Executive Committee for Expedited Permitting.

<sup>&</sup>quot;Developing our energy resources to grow our economy and protecting the environment are

not mutually exclusive. However, while conducting the review outlined in the Executive Order, we found that several costly and burdensome regulations from the past threaten that balance by hampering the production or transmission of our domestic energy," **said U.S. Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke**. "Our public lands are meant to be managed for the benefit of the people. That means a multiple-use approach where appropriate and making sure that multiple-use includes energy development under reasonable regulations. Following President Trump's leadership, Interior is fostering domestic energy production by streamlining permitting and revising and repealing Obama-era job killing regulations – all while doing so in an environmentally responsible way."

"The federal government can and must be a better business partner," Vincent DeVito, Counselor to the Secretary for Energy Policy, said. "Secretary Zinke's bold approach to achieving American energy dominance is making our nation freer, more secure, and more prosperous. Regulations should not unnecessarily burden energy production, but that is what occurs in many cases. The recent actions outlined in this energy report show how Interior is rolling back some of these burdensome regulations that add little or no value, while promoting responsible energy development."

The report identified a number of burdens that specifically impede the production and transportation of energy resources, including, but not limited to:

- **Obama-Era 5-Year Program** Under the last Administration, 94% of the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) was put off-limits from leasing, having an adverse effect on jobs and energy dominance, while drastically reducing access to future revenue.
  - Trump Administration Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3350</u>, <u>America-First Offshore Energy Strategy</u> started the process of developing a new 5-Year Program to responsibly develop the OCS and generate much-needed revenue.
- Federal Coal Leasing Moratorium (Secretarial Order 3338, Discretionary Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement to Modernize the Federal Coal Program) Nearly 40% of our nation's coal comes from public lands. The 2016 coal moratorium undermines American energy security, inhibits job creation, and reduces revenues to state and local governments.
  - Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3348, Concerning the Federal Coal</u>
     <u>Moratorium</u> repealed the Obama-era moratorium on new federal coal leases.
- Hydraulic Fracturing on Federal and Indian Lands Rule The compliance costs of the existing 2015 rule on hydraulic fracturing are not justified. All 32 states with federal oil and gas leases and some tribes currently have laws or regulations that address hydraulic fracturing operations.
  - Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3349</u>: <u>American Energy Independence</u> put the rule under review. The BLM published a rulemaking to rescind the rule on July 25th.
- Waste Prevention, Production Subject to Royalties, and Resource Conservation AKA the Venting and Flaring Rule The rule imposes a substantial burden on industry, especially for marginal well production in energy-rich states like New Mexico, particularly the requirements that are set to become effective on January 17, 2018.
  - Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3349</u>: <u>American Energy Independence</u> put the rules under review for subsequent action by the Department. On October 5, 2017, the BLM issued a proposed rule to temporarily suspend certain requirements of the rule. The BLM is also actively reviewing the underlying regulation for potential revision.
- Unnecessarily lengthy NEPA reviews delay projects The NEPA process has added extra time and analysis to project completion, which adds to uncertainty for industry and higher costs for taxpayers. This is particularly true for Departmental actions that

impact energy and infrastructure projects, such as resource management planning, permitting, and issuance of rights-of-way for pipeline projects and electricity transmission.

- Actions: The Department has identified a number of rules and regulations to revise or rescind such as the Master Leasing Plans, the NEPA Compliance for Oil and Gas Lease Reinstatement Petitions, and the Sage-Grouse Resource Management Plans. In addition, the Deputy Secretary issued an August memo setting a deadline of one year and limiting EIS statements to 150 pages or 300 pages for unusually complex projects.
- Holding energy producers hostage via Compensatory Mitigation (Secretarial Order 3330) Current compensatory mitigation policies have reduced predictability, created conflicts, and unnecessarily increased permitting/authorization timelines. Additionally, industry stakeholders believe the mitigation planning goal exceeds statutory authority. Currently, Interior and its bureaus lack a consistent terminology and framework for mitigation.
  - Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3349</u>: <u>American Energy Independence</u> reexamined the use of mitigation policies and practices in order to better balance conservation strategies and job creation. Bureaus at the Interior will review various handbooks and manuals on the use of mitigation for energy and infrastructure projects.
- Systematic delays in the leasing program and permitting process The long period from when acreage is first nominated to when those acres are offered at a lease sale, as well as delays between the lease sale date and when leases are awarded reduces industry certainty and hinders states from receiving their share of lease sale revenues. These delays have rendered industry less able to plan for and execute exploration and production strategies in a timely fashion, and less able to respond effectively to changing market conditions.
  - Action: Secretarial Order 3354 Supporting and Improving the Federal Onshore Oil and Gas Leasing Program and Federal Solid Mineral Leasing Program. Secretarial Order 3358 to form a permit expediting committee. In January 2017 there were 92 vacancies in key positions related to the permitting process. Since that time this administration has filled nearly half of those positions. The BLM is also modernizing the software used to track and coordinate permitting while seeking to add regional teams that will be able to greatly streamline the permitting process. So far this year the BLM has decreased their processing time for APDs by an average of 46 days.
- Endangered Species Act The Endangered Species Act (ESA) is taken into consideration for both on- and offshore energy and infrastructure projects. It has farreaching negative impacts on energy production and transmission as well as on critical infrastructure projects. ESA abuses have led to increased costs and delays on projects.
  - Action: <u>Secretarial Order 3353: Greater Sage-Grouse Conservation and Cooperation with Western States</u> Work with the Western Governors Association and other local partners to develop recommendations to improve the application of the ESA. Launch a review of ESA regulations and policy documents regarding outdated, unnecessary, ineffective, and inconsistently aligned with Executive and Secretarial Orders.

The report also detailed extensive action taken to advance American Energy Dominance at the Department of the Interior, including, but not limited to:

- Secretarial Order 3351: Strengthening the Department of the Interior's Energy Portfolio
- Secretarial Order 3352: National Petroleum Reserve Alaska
- <u>Secretarial Order 3353: Greater Sage-Grouse Conservation and Cooperation with</u> Western States
- Reestablishing the Royalty Policy Committee to ensure the public continues to receive

the full value of energy produced on federal lands.

• Review, repeal, and rewriting of the following rules: the BSEE Well Control and BOP Rules, the ONRR Valuation Rule, and the OSMRE Stream Protection Rule.

To all BLM Employees,

How many times have you thought, "why do we do that" or "we could do this better"?

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has directed each Executive Branch Department to develop a plan to enhance efficiency by leveraging technology, streamlining processes, considering other serviced delivery models and leveraging existing requirements. Additionally, each Department is required to identify which functions their agencies perform that are not core to their mission, are redundant with other organizations or can be restructured.

This is a priority initiative across the Federal Government and work will progress quickly over the next several months.

I have has established a Reform Team currently led by Jamie Connell, Oregon/Washington State Director with help from Tim Murphy, State Director, Idaho; Janine Velasco, Assistant Director Business, Fiscal and Information Resources Management; Jody Hudson, Assistant Director, Human Capital Management; and Aden Seidlitz, Associate State Director, New Mexico.

The Reform Team will review the BLM's current alignment of functions and identify gaps where resources may need to be redirected; reevaluate past studies of zoning and regionalization and other streamlining and efficiency efforts, to determine how the BLM can best move forward with pursuing further streamlining; and identify opportunities to delegate authority further down in the organization. The Reform Team will also evaluate options for organizational consolidations within BLM and consider areas of improvement already under review by the Business Management Council and the Field Committee. Finally, the Reform Team will consider whether functional realignments involving agencies outside the BLM could streamline mission delivery and improve customer service.

One important aspect of the initial efforts of the BLM's Reform Team is documenting the work the BLM has already done, or is doing, to streamline and improve business processes, including regionalizing the Law Enforcement program, zoning of some energy, minerals and lands functions, implementing regional planning for Sage Grouse, centralizing the IT support function and modernizing the BLM's hiring process (on-going).

Now, how can you help and what about those good ideas?

First and foremost, I want to thank you for being a part of the BLM family and encourage you to

keep working on the highest priorities. Second, offer up your creative and innovative ideas. This is a unique opportunity for the BLM to "think big" and to challenge the status quo.
